## Bicycling in Asheville

It isn't Nirvana (or Minneapolis or Portland or Boulder) yet, but...

## Where we began:

- First bike lanes in about 2002
  - o Riverside Dr
  - Lyman St

#### Where we are:

- We achieved bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community recognition
  - We continue to work with the community to maintain and improve that designation
- By adding facilities
  - Since the College Street conversion in 2004, we have added bicycle facilities to 9 miles of city streets
    - We have begun to use green markings where we think it would be helpful to avoid conflicts
      - S. Lexington Ave + more to come
  - Two Fixit stations
    - Clingman Roundabout
    - Carrier Park
  - Signal detector marking at loop-activated city signals (see symbol on last page)
  - We continue to add bike racks on the sidewalk where we can
  - All of our city parking decks have under cover bicycle parking, usually near the attendant's booth
  - o There are 20 bike lockers in various places downtown
    - Parking services rents them; only \$10/month
- By keeping what we have worth using
  - We have maintenance plan for bike facilities that includes sweeping twice as often as other streets
  - AshevilleApp lets you report issues and see what others are reporting
- By working with partners
  - Like Asheville on Bikes, the Blue Ridge Bike Club, the Bicycle and Pedestrian Task Force, and the YWCA – who will sell you a discounted membership if you bike to the gym or if you just want a place to get a shower on the way in to work
- · By working to get it right
  - Council adopted a Complete Streets policy in 2012

- Staff now working on implementation incorporating into our rules and our culture
- Continued investment in resources and staff training on facility design and operation
- o Investigating each reported bicycle crash from an engineering perspective




Figure 9C-7. Bicycle Detector Pavement Marking
